In Revelation 2:1–7, we find Jesus’ message to the Church in Ephesus, which we can apply to our own lives. Jesus begins this letter by revealing His identity to the Church: **“He who holds the seven stars in His right hand, who walks in the midst of the seven golden lampstands.”** Jesus is the supreme authority; He has the final word and acts (or moves) according to His own timing and will. Jesus then tells the Church that He knows them and lists their many good deeds (v. 2–3). God is compiling a vast record of all the good we do; the length of that list does not depend on God, but on us. An important point is the statement that **“you cannot tolerate those who are evil”**, rejecting harmful conversations, addictions, and bad habits is a way of rejecting evil. These small victories lead to success and the greatness we so eagerly await.

We now reach a crucial point in the letter where Jesus voices a complaint against the church: **“You have forsaken your first love.”** What is this “first love”? It is loving God with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength (Matt. 12:30). We love God in good times and in difficult times; we love Him when we are happy and when we are sad. We do not let our emotions rule us; instead, our emotions reflect the love we have for God. Although Jesus rebukes the Church, He also says: **“Remember from where you have fallen and return to Me”** (v. 5). If we have drifted away, let us return to reading the Bible, praying, fasting, gathering with the congregation, and attending our spiritual retreats and the ministries where we once served. Let us do this out of love, because we desire to see God’s face smiling upon us. If we fail to do so, we will miss out on the many blessings God has already prepared for us (Prov. 28:13).
